Welcome to a two-day workshop on Digitalization and Multimodality!

The workshop is organized by the research group *Multimodal Communication* and the doctoral school *Multimodality and Intermediality: Humanist Research in a Digital World (MIDWorld)*. The workshop takes place on campus at Örebro university, from lunch to lunch on 12th and 13th of September.

The aim of the workshop is to further explore the main theme of MIDWorld – digitalization, multimodality and intermediality – from various perspectives. To this end, three of MIDWorld's external scientific advisors are invited to the workshop:

- o Professor John Bateman, University of Bremen, Germany.
- o Professor Martin Engebretsen, University of Agder, Norway.
- o Professor Gunhild Kvåle, University of Agder, Norway.

On the first day of the workshop, the invited guests will address the theme from their respective research perspectives. At the end of day one, the PhD students of MIDWorld meet and make plans for the second day of the workshop. In groups, they will prepare questions and topics for discussion during day two. The questions and topics on day two should relate to digitalization, multimodality and intermediality, with reference to some of the preparatory readings and to some of the issues discussed by the invited guests and the references. The PhD students will chair and lead the discussions on day two.
